3.2	 Chair Avramchuk provided the following response from Claudio Lindow, Interim VP of Adminstration and Finance/CFO to Senator Harris' intent to raise questions from the meeting of September 10, 2024 (ASM 24-3): 1. The paint is a campus standard color/sheen used throughout campus, including classrooms. The campus has (3) standard colors, and this specific one was chosen for its warmer color and eggshell sheen for cleanability. The lighting is a standard CREE LED fixture chosen to replace the existing fluorescent fixtures. These new LED fixtures have daylighting controls, which will lower the artificial light in replacement for the use of available daylighting. The lighting fixtures have occupancy controls that will shut off the lighting if the room is not in use. 2. Accessibility was a consideration; for example, the new interior room signage has corrected the mounting location, used non-glare material, and used braille. Paint color and sheen are not regulated under building code. Similarly, glare is not regulated under building code. Similarly, glare is not regulated under building code. Similarly, glare is not regulated under building code. The lighting level is a minimum prescribed at 10 footcandles (107 lux) but there is no maximum or prescriptive for room use. The Illumination Engineering Society Standards are a recognized standard that help provide guidelines for design. 3. Items 1: Ceilings and walls are white or light colored. Item 3: Uights are dimmable to allow fine-tuning the light to the teaching environment and time of use. The lights do not block sight. Facilities will hire a consultant to measure for glare and make any adjustments needed to reduce any found. Item 4: The light distribution is even throughout the rooms. Item 5: California Electrical Code in Part 3 of Title 24 of the California Code of Regulations. The renovation work used existing installation for the electrical infrastructure and, therefore, did not use any portion of the CCR T24, Part 3. Rather CC

Room users can adjust those controls. The university will also review removing some of the fixtures in the classroom. New lighting allows for the adjustment of its overall lighting level, and with this concern being raised, the university will adjust the hallway lighting for a better experience. 5. The hallway echo is being addressed through the installation of sound 	
			absorption material. Further clarification is needed for the classrooms; it would be helpful to understand more specifically what issues are being experienced. The American National Standards Institute's (ANSI) Standard S12.60 is a national standard for acoustical performance and relates to the impact of background noise and reverberation time on speech intelligibility in classrooms. The ANSI Standard has no mention of paint or light.
