Alexis Ramirez is a Sophomore majoring in Theatre, with an interest in creative writing and marketing. She would like to thank her family and friends for supporting her dreams.







## Tanya Kane-Parry (Director)

Professor in the Department of Theatre and Dance. Teaches dance, acting and Viewpoints. Professionally, she is a director/choreographer in theatre, opera, dance. Credits include productions at Long Beach Opera, LA Phil, Festival Opera, Opera Omaha, Houston Grand Opera, Washington National Opera, Los Angeles Opera, Canadian Opera Company, Liceo Opera (Barcelona), National Opera of Bordeaux, Angels Vocal Arts and Napa Valley Festival. In more recent years, she has been invited by Positional Projects to create solo performances and videos in response to environmentally related locations and themes. These works and more can be seen on her YouTube channel.

Patricia "Melo Gia" Lewis (Choreographer) referred by her colleges as the "Swiss army knife" is a Puerto Rican and African American artist known across the east coast, Los Angeles and Puerto Rico as a multi-faceted talent with many hats in the visual arts and musical fields. She has been a professional vocalist and composer for 17 years, a tattoo artist for 6 years and a Puerto Rican folklore dancer and vocalist for nearly 10 years. Born and raised in the island of Puerto Rico, she began her artistic journey painting and sculpting at Central High School for Visual Arts while, spending her evenings singing and playing the violin at Puerto Rico's Music Conservatory Youth String Program since



the age of 7. After graduating from Central Visual Arts High School and the Conservatory's String Program at 17, Patricia received a generous scholarship to attend Berklee College of Music in 2005 with vocals being her main instrument and violin second. She received a Bachelor's Degree for Music Business upon graduation. Patricia later returned to Puerto Rico to curate her knowledge and experience in Afro-Puerto Rican folklore. She began dancing and singing Bomba music in 2015. She also toured the world with renowned Grammy Winning reggae band "Cultura Profética". She landed the leading role for the Spanish adaptation of *Once on this Island* and performed at the historical University of Puerto Rico Theater. However, everything abruptly stopped in 2017. Hurricane María, the strongest hurricane ever recorded in history, devastated Puerto Rico. Work stopped for most artists in the island and Patricia was forced to migrate to Philadelphia and later New York. Music never stopped for Patricia. She continues to write and do vocal producing for herself and other artists. She has been a proud Puerto Rican cultural ambassador in Los Angeles, working, learning and teaching with LA's top Bomba groups; Taller Kerubina led by Maritxell Carrero and the Los Angeles Bomba Collective led by Jhan Lee Aponte.





Sophie Goldstein (Playwright/Dramaturg) is a Jewish Chicana from Los Angeles, CA and a proud alumna of the Cal State LA Theatre Department. After graduating in 2010, she went on to receive her MFA in Physical Theatre from the Accademia Dell'Arte in Arezzo, Italy. She has directed and/or choreographed with several Los Angeles theaters and educational institutions including: Vagrancy, Son of Semele, Leo Rising, 2Cents, Dean Productions, Cal State LA, and La Crescenta High School. She has assistant directed numerous opera productions with Tanya Kane-Parry at Bakersfield Symphony Orchestra and Angels Vocal Arts. She has taught movement, Commedia

Dell'Arte, and acting classes/workshops, at Cal State LA, A Noise Within, Azusa Pacific University, and Loyola Marymount. In 2022 she was a writer finalist for a monologue competition sponsored by Nosotros. Her 10-Minute play *Rosa* was part of the 2022 Frida Kahlo Festival and then adapted into a short film by Sherry Mandujano. Her one-act play *This House is Legacy* was selected and performed at the 2024 Hanne Pedersen competition in Carpinteria, CA. Two of her 10-Minute plays were selected for upcoming festivals in Michigan and Illinois. She is a member of the LA Female Playwrights Initiative and Company of Angels playwright's group.

**Ileanna Santiago Ruiz** (*Musician*) originally from Aguadilla, Puerto Rico, has been immersed in music since birth, thanks to her father, renowned international percussionist Freddie Santiago. Though she moved to Los Angeles in 2017 and built a career as an industrial psychologist, her passion for Bomba—a traditional Afro-Puerto Rican genre that blends drumming, dance, and song—has been a central part of her life since 2015. Bomba holds deep cultural significance, symbolizing resilience, community, and the enduring legacy of African traditions in Puerto Rico.
