



FALL 2021 NEWSLETTER










Dawn A. Dennis has collaborated with the Los Angeles Regional Reentry Partnership, Cal State LA Project Rebound, and the Special Collections at the college library to build The Public Memory Project, an online archive that amplifies the voices of incarcerated and formerly incarcerated men and women. This project serves as a foundation for an oral history collection that is focused on the lived experiences of incarcerated and formerly incarcerated men and women through the collection of letters, artwork, and ephemera. Additionally, Dr. Dennis has continued her archival work with the Mervyn M. Dymally collection.



Pedro Quijada (MA, History, 2010) defended his PhD dissertation, "The Forgotten El Salvador: A Study of the Emergence and Downfall of the "Bright Spot" of Central America, 1948-1978," at the University of Minnesota in May 2021.



In 1997, I returned to CSULA and completed a BS in Criminal Justice (99) and then an MA in History (2004). In 2017, after twenty nine-years, I retired from the Los Angeles Police Department as a Detective III (detective supervisor).
